

Checklist of Items Recommended for Each Deferred *De Minimis* Stockwater Use Claim in the Snake River Basin Adjudication (SRBA) if Claiming Water Right on Federal Land

___ A completed Motion for Determination of Deferred *De Minimis* Domestic or Stock Water Use.

(You can get your claim number from the Idaho Department of Water Resources (IDWR)).

___ The current base property information. The base property is the land that you own and that is identified on your application for a grazing permit.

___ Evidence of Priority, which can be one of the following:

- If the stockwater use on federal land predates the Taylor Grazing Act (June 28, 1934)¹, submit evidence that the claimed use occurred at the claimed location on the claimed priority date.
- If the stockwater use on federal land commenced with the Taylor Grazing Act of 1934 (June 28, 1934), submit evidence of priority, which may include a copy of the first, or earliest grazing permit issued on the federal grazing allotment.
- If the stockwater use on federal land first occurred after the Taylor Grazing Act, submit evidence of authority to graze stock on federal land consistent with the claimed priority date.

___ A copy of the current grazing permit associated with the base property for the place of use claimed.

___ A map of the grazing allotment.

___ If your claimed place of use also has water rights that were decreed to another party in the SRBA, it would be helpful if you could provide a list of the water right numbers for those decreed water rights to the Department.

Note: One check (maximum \$100.00) made out to IDWR for all of the *de minimis* stockwater-only claims filed by a claimant must be sent with a motion and notice of claim to the SRBA Court. See Idaho Code § 42-1414.

¹ In most cases, the federal grazing authorization will be associated with the Taylor Grazing Act (June 28, 1934).
