IN THE MATTER OF MANAGEMENT OF THE EASTERN SNAKE PLAIN AQUIFER

RESOLUTION TO EXPRESS IWRB SUPPORT FOR THE 2024 STIPULATED MITIGATION PLAN AND COMMITMENT TO EASTERN SNAKE PLAIN AQUIFER PROJECTS

1 WHEREAS, the Idaho Water Resource Board (IWRB) is responsible for the conservation, 2 development, management, and optimum use of Idaho's water resources, including the Eastern Snake 3 Plain Aquifer (ESPA); and 4 5 WHEREAS, the Idaho Constitution, Article XV, Section 7, establishes that the IWRB shall have the 6 duty of formulating and implementing a state water policy, developing, and conserving Idaho's water 7 resources, and that the legislature shall provide funding mechanisms to further these objectives; and 8 9 WHEREAS, the ESPA is a critical water source, supplying groundwater to approximately one 10 million acres of irrigated farmland, municipalities, businesses, and industries across southern and eastern 11 Idaho; and 12 13 WHEREAS, the ESPA is hydraulically connected to the Snake River, contributing to surface water 14 supplies for approximately 600,000 acres in the Magic Valley, as well as supporting aquaculture, 15 downstream hydropower generation, and other beneficial uses; and 16 17 WHEREAS, since 1952, the volume of groundwater stored in the ESPA has declined due to changes 18 in irrigation practices, groundwater development, and other factors, resulting in reduced spring flows, 19 diminished surface water supplies, and increased water conflicts; and 20 21 WHEREAS, the State of Idaho has previously committed to addressing these challenges through legislative measures, including Senate Concurrent Resolutions 136 and 138 in 2016, which established a 22 23 managed recharge goal of 250,000 acre-feet annually and endorsed agreements between surface and 24 groundwater users to sustain water resources; and 25 WHEREAS, the 2024 Stipulated Mitigation Plan, executed on November 15, 2024, between the 26 27 Surface Water Coalition and participating Groundwater Districts, supersedes prior agreements and 28 continues groundwater conservation, managed aquifer recharge, and mitigation activities; and 29 30 WHEREAS, the IWRB recognizes the necessity of additional investments in water infrastructure and managed aquifer recharge projects to achieve a revised ESPA managed recharge goal of 350,000 acre-31 32 feet annually, as outlined in proposed updates to the State Water Plan through Senate Concurrent 33 Resolution 110; and 34 35 WHEREAS, in accordance with Idaho Code § 42-1760, expenditures from the water management account shall support projects that contribute to the long-term stability of Idaho's water resources, 36 37 including but not limited to: Resolution No._____

38	1. The construction of a raise of Anderson Ranch Dam on the South Fork of the Boise River;	
39	2. The Mountain Home Air Force Base water delivery and treatment systems; and	
40	3. The identification, study, construction, and expansion of managed aquifer recharge	sites,
41	groundwater-to-surface water conversion projects, and water measurement infrastructure	above
42	Milner Dam, based on scientific data and technical analysis to enhance the ESPA and fulfill I	daho's
43	commitments under legislative resolutions.

45	NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Idaho Water Resource Board formally expres	ses its
46	support for the 2024 Stipulated Mitigation Plan and commits to identifying and advancing project	ts that
47	reinforce the objectives of the agreement; and

49	NOW, THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the IWRB will prioritize the implementa	tion of
50	projects that restore the ESPA, improve Snake River reach gains between Blackfoot and the Mi	nidoka
51	Dam, and sustain Idaho's water users while minimizing economic harm; and	
52		
53	NOW, THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that when selecting and implementing project	ts, the
54	IWRB shall consider the impacts on existing water rights, water quality, economic stability, d	rought
55	resiliency, and overall water sustainability for the benefit of the state's citizens; and	
56		
57	NOW, THEREFORE BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the IWRB will seek public input in the se	lection
58	and implementation of projects and will work collaboratively with stakeholders to ensure the con	tinued
59	viability of Idaho's water resources.
