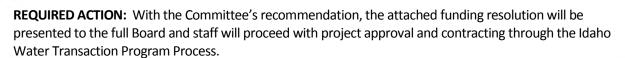

## **Background:**

Knapp Creek, located in the Upper Middle Fork Salmon Basin, is tributary to Marsh Creek. Marsh Creek and Bear Valley Creek form the Middle Fork Salmon River. ESA-listed Chinook salmon, steelhead, and bull trout currently utilize Knapp Creek for spawning and rearing. The Middle Fork Salmon basin has not been supplemented with hatchery fish and therefore, other than occasional strays, the population is of natural origin. Furthermore, the Middle Fork Salmon River contains the highest elevation spawning grounds in the world for spring/summer Chinook salmon.

Located in Custer County approximately 20 miles from Stanley, Idaho, Cape Horn Ranch, LLC (CHR, LLC) holds WR No. 77-4208 in the amount of 6.5 cfs for irrigation of 159 acres from Knapp Creek. The Board's purchase of Knapp Creek WR No. 77-4207 is expected to be completed by December 2018. As a result, CHR, LLC will be the only remaining irrigation diversion on Knapp Creek and there are no irrigation diversions on Marsh Creek or Bear Valley Creek. Hence, WR No. 77-4208 is the last remaining irrigation diversion in the headwater tributaries of the Middle Fork Salmon Basin.

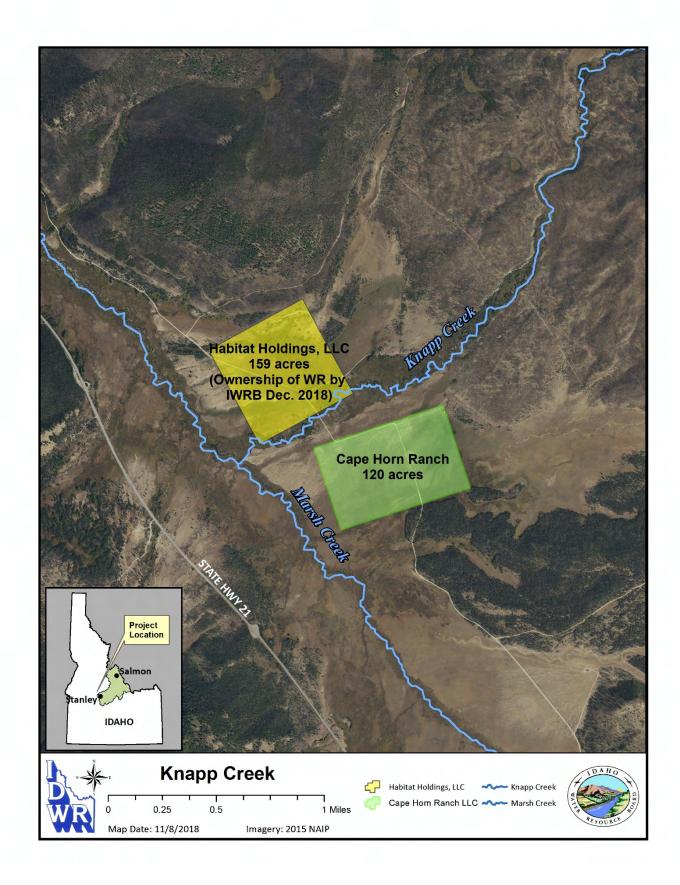
The owner of CHR, LLC is interested in leasing 120 acres of WR No. 77-4208 into the water supply bank. The lease transaction will add 4.9 cfs to Knapp Creek.

Staff proposes compensating the water right owners \$57.72 per acre over a 5-year period (2019-2023). Mark Olson, Natural Resource Conservation Service in Salmon, prepared a report detailing the analysis used to determine the price per acre. The total transaction costs would be \$37,479.00 (\$37,229.00 landowner payment and \$250 lease application fee) to be received from the Columbia Basin Water Transaction Program Fund. Funds for the annual payment to the water right owner will be held in the Water Transaction Subaccount of the Board's Revolving Development Account.

#### **Request for Committee Recommendation**

Staff requests comments and a recommendation from the Committee regarding the transaction. Recommendations from the Committee and a resolution to approve the transaction will be introduced to the full Board on November 28, 2018.

**REQUIRED ACTION:** Recommendation from Committee to approve and fund agreements not to divert and funding for administration by Water District 74.

#### **Background**

The Lemhi River Basin is an important basin for the spawning, migration and rearing of Chinook salmon, summer steelhead, westslope cutthroat trout, and bull trout. During the irrigation season, low flows at the L-6 diversion can cause migration barriers for out-migrating juvenile Chinook salmon and inmigrating adult Chinook salmon and steelhead. The State of Idaho has committed to maintaining flows between 25 and 35 cfs at the L-6 diversion (See attached map) through the 2004 Snake River Water Rights Agreement. The 35 cfs flows are needed for out-migration in the spring and 25 cfs is needed for in-migrating adults in the mid- to late-summer.

For the past 13 years, the IWRB has been working to meet the 35 cfs target through agreements between the IWRB and water users "not to divert" from the Lemhi River. As identified below, a total of 19.39 cfs is currently protected permanently or through long-term agreements:

These agreements have been administered in accordance with a contract between the IWRB and Water District 74. As permanent agreements have been acquired the amount of water needed through annual leases has decreased.

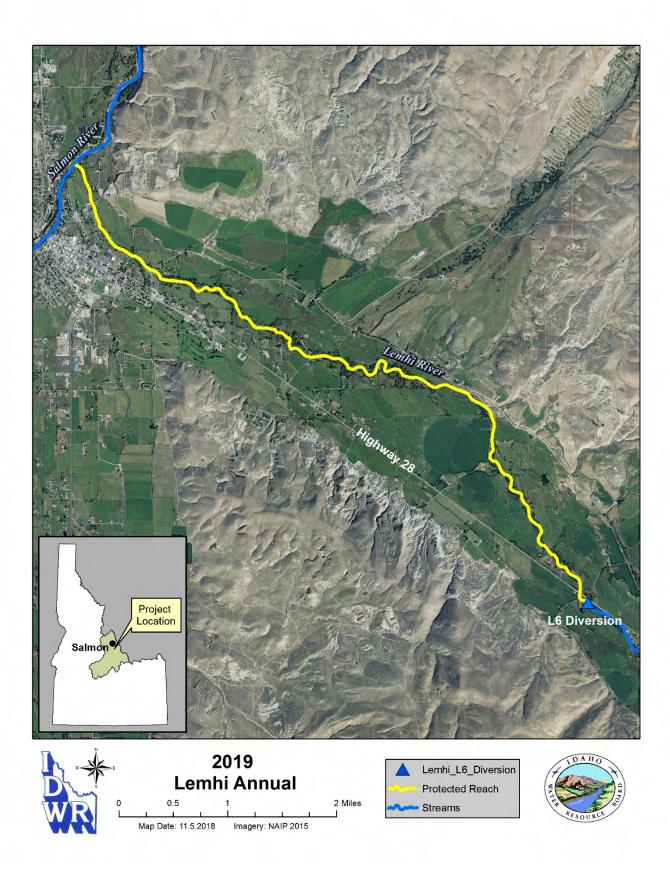


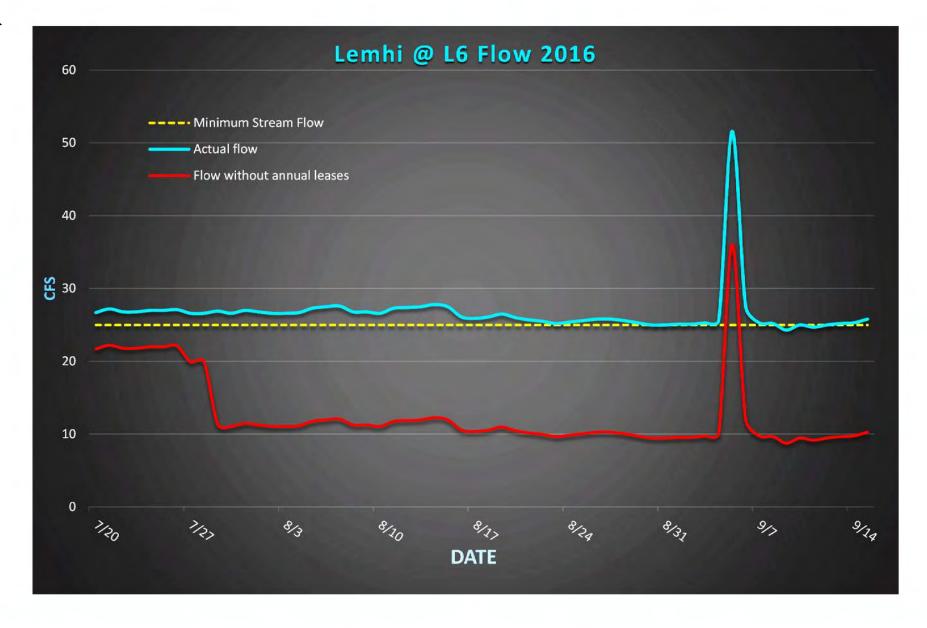
Staff proposes development of additional short-term agreements to reduce or eliminate the gap of 15.61 cfs between the permanent and long-term transactions and the 35 cfs flow target. As in previous years, payment will be based on the number of days the irrigators are turned off with compensation of \$90.00/24-hour cfs. Irrigators will only be curtailed when the flow targets are not being met and up to a maximum of 100 days, which is unlikely unless severe, unprecedented drought conditions persist throughout the entire irrigation season.

The state of Idaho signed a 4-year extension of the 2008 Columbia Basin Fish Accords MOA in September 2018, and the Idaho Water Transaction Program has a total budget of \$1,218,406 for years 2019 through 2022. Therefore, staff recommends entering into short-term agreements with the Lower Lemhi irrigators and the Water District for years 2019 through 2022. The agreements not to divert will not exceed \$105,105.00 annually, and the Water District 74 administration contract will not exceed \$12,000 annually. Total funding for the 2019-2022 agreements with the Lower Lemhi irrigators and the Water District will not exceed \$468,420.00. Funding for these agreements will come from the 2019-2022 Idaho Fish Accord contract or the Columbia Basin Water Transaction Program Fund.

**REQUIRED ACTION:** With the Committee's recommendation, the attached funding resolution will be presented to the full Board and staff will proceed with project approval and contracting through the Idaho Water Transaction Program Process.

#### **Background:**

The 2004 Snake River Water Rights ("Nez Perce") Agreement commits the state to providing incentives for improving fish habitat which includes improving or protecting flow conditions to augment stream flows. Morgan Creek, a tributary to the Salmon River near Challis, is important for the spawning, migration and rearing of ESA-listed steelhead and bull trout. It also supports the rearing of ESA-listed juvenile Chinook salmon. Morgan Creek typically becomes dewatered below the lowest two diversions (SMC 2-4 and SMC 1) during the irrigation season, blocking access to those fish species. For the past 12 years, the IWRB has held agreements not to divert with the two water users on those diversions from Morgan Creek. Rather than divert from Morgan Creek, they left at least 2 cfs in the creek during the low flow periods to maintain adequate flows in Morgan Creek to the confluence with the Salmon River. The water was instead pumped out of a Salmon River ditch that carries existing Salmon River water rights appurtenant to the same ground. In return, the irrigators were compensated based on the cost of pumping water from the Salmon River ditch.

While the agreements have sustained a minimum flow over the past 12 years, the approach to flow restoration over that time has changed. Instead of addressing only flow limitations, Board staff works with Upper Salmon Basin partners to develop transactions that can complement projects addressing all limiting factors, while maintaining the local economy.

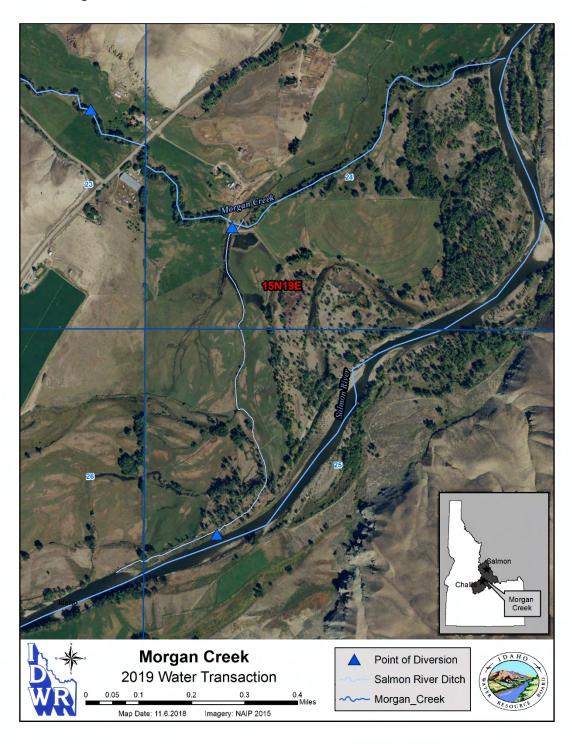
High flows on Morgan Creek in 2017 caused physical damage to a portion of the transacted reach and as a result, one of the water users is interested in a longer-term, more holistic solution to his irrigation practices. IWRB staff is working with Idaho Fish and Game, Bureau of Reclamation, and the Custer Soil and Water Conservation District on a long term plan, which may involve re-locating a fish screen, siphoning Salmon River ditch water under Morgan Creek, and a new head gate on the Salmon River. In the meantime, it is important to secure the gains that have already been made.

The proposed one year agreement not to divert would be an extension of the same terms and pricing structure of the previous agreements. The Morgan Creek water users will be compensated only when they are required to pump to maintain the 2 cfs flow. The maximum payment is based upon an annual five percent increase from the 2018 payment, with the total not to exceed \$10,205.15. Funding for the transaction would come from the Columbia Basin Water Transaction Fund.

**REQUIRED ACTION:** The Committee is asked to consider two new permanent transactions. With the Committee's recommendation, the attached funding resolution will be presented to the full Board and staff will proceed with project approval and contracting through the Idaho Water Transaction Program Process.

#### Background:

The Lemhi River Basin is an important basin for the spawning, migration, and rearing of Chinook salmon, summer steelhead, westslope cutthroat trout, and bull trout. During the irrigation season, low flows at the L-6 diversion can cause migration barriers for out-migrating juvenile Chinook salmon and in-migrating adult Chinook salmon and steelhead. The State of Idaho committed to maintaining flows between 25 and 35 cfs at the L-6 diversion (map below) in the Lemhi Framework which was developed as part of the 2004 Snake River Water Rights (Nez Perce) Agreement. The agreement carries forward target goals which were included in earlier conservation agreements developed and approved by local water users and state and federal agencies. The 35 cfs flows are needed for out-migration in the spring and 25 cfs is needed for in-migrating adults in the mid-to-late summer.

Through enacting Idaho Code 42-1506 and 42-1765A, the Idaho Legislature directed the Board to establish a minimum streamflow water right of 35 cfs in the Lower Lemhi River to be met through water right rentals or other appropriate methods under state law.

For the past several years, the Board has been working to meet the 35 cfs target. Efforts have led to the following:

The annual subordination agreements and permanent agreements allow water users to irrigate their full irrigated acreage unless the Board's minimum stream flow water right is not being met. As flows approach 35 cfs, participants rotate use to maintain the minimum flow. After July 1, flows are allowed to drop to 25 cfs. There are limited times when all participants are not diverting, but when flows



increase, they can divert and irrigate. In some years, the participants have full access to their water rights throughout the irrigation season. The subordination agreements allow maximum use of water whenever flows are above the minimum 25-35 cfs, while providing a minimum flow to protect movement of ESA-listed species.

In order to move towards the goal of protecting 35 cfs instream in perpetuity, staff proposes to enter into permanent subordination agreements with Mark and Kim Olson for 0.16 cfs from the L-6 diversion (Water Right No. 74-15952) and Kim Thomas for 1.14 cfs from the L-6 diversion (Water Right Nos. 74-14995 and 74-15010). The agreements allow irrigation when flows are above 25-35 cfs. The Olson and Thomas families have been participating in the annual agreements to date, and would like to make the agreements permanent.

Funds are available for the agreements from the Idaho Fish Accord Water Transactions Fund and the Columbia Basin Water Transaction Program Fund. The cost of the two new transactions is based on a 2018 appraisal completed by Henri LeMoyne Appraisal Services which established a price of \$100,000 per cfs. An additional \$12,000 per cfs will be placed in the water transaction sub-account of the IWRB's Revolving Development Account to pay for contracts with Water District 74 for administration of the subordination agreements. The total cost of the two transactions is \$145,000 (\$17,920 for Olson; \$127,680 Thomas) for 1.3 cfs of permanently-protected flow at L-6. These transactions will increase the total amount of permanently-protected flow at L-6 to 16.8 cfs.

#### **Request for Committee Recommendation**

Staff requests comments and a recommendation from the Committee regarding these transactions. Recommendations from the Committee and a resolution to approve the transactions will be introduced to the full Board at the November 28, 2018 IWRB meeting.

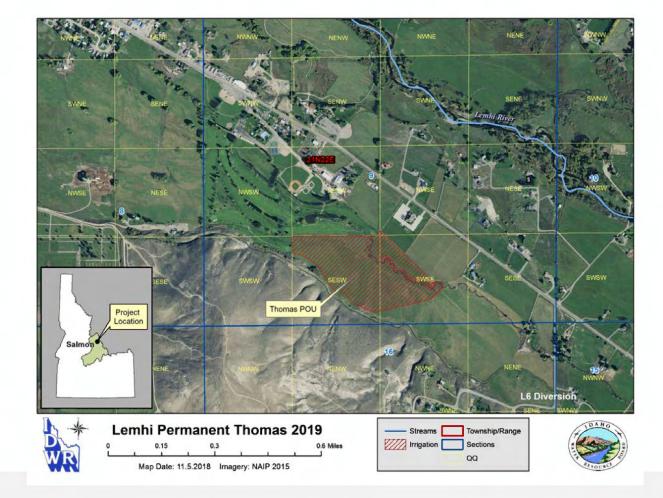

Re: Water Transaction Program – Bar G Farm Lease 2019-2023



**REQUIRED ACTION:** With the Committee's recommendation, the attached funding resolution will be presented to the full Board and staff will proceed with project approval and contracting through the Idaho Water Transaction Program Process.

#### **Background:**

The Pahsimeroi River Basin, in Central Idaho, provides enormous potential as spawning and rearing habitat for anadromous fish, particularly steelhead and Chinook salmon. Little Mud Creek, tributary of the Pahsimeroi River was previously intercepted and mostly dewatered by a cross-ditch until the 2008 Pahsimeroi P-9 ditch removal project eliminated the cross ditch and allowed Little Mud Creek to flow freely into the Pahsimeroi River. Flow does remain a limiting factor for Little Mud Creek, which has also been identified as important habitat for juvenile Chinook rearing. The Pahsimeroi River also benefitted from the P-9 removal project, and recent spawning results are encouraging. However, flow does remain limited in most reaches of the Pahsimeroi River.

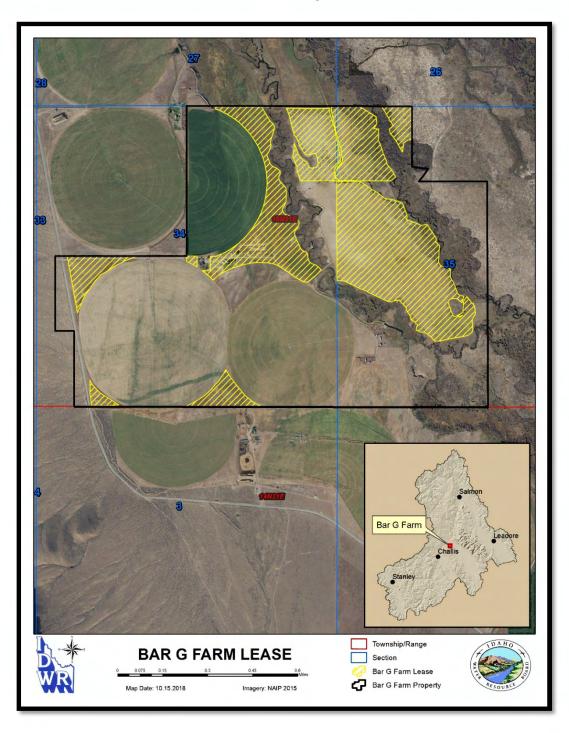
Bar G Farm, owned by Billy and Rivers Gydesen, diverts water out of Little Mud Creek and the Pahsimeroi River to irrigate approximately 147 acres using both flood and hand line irrigation methods. The remaining ranch acreage is under three pivots and is leased to an adjacent landowner. The high labor costs and the relatively low return on production associated with the flood and hand line acreage has convinced the Gydesen family that a lease of that acreage is a good short-term solution as they continue to develop a long-term strategy for their farm and ranch. A long-term lease has been discussed with the Gydesen family and may become part of the overall strategy.

The 5-year transaction will secure up to 4.6 cfs of flow to the Pahsimeroi River by leasing a portion of water rights numbers 73-10005, 73-11982, 73-90, 73-11978 and the full portion of water right numbers 73-11992, 73-11988, and 73-11987. The transaction will add 0.75 cfs to Little Mud Creek with a portion of water right 73-11981. However, the Little Mud Creek diversion will be closed during the lease period. The full right of 2.25 cfs will remain instream.

Staff proposes compensating the water right owners at a price of \$36.97 per acre over a 5-year period (2019-2023). Mark Olson, Natural Resource Conservation Service in Salmon, prepared a report detailing the analysis used to determine the cost per acre. The total transaction costs would be \$33,972.30 (\$27,172.95 rental payment, \$5,299.35 rental fees, and \$1,500.00 application fees) to be received at a discounted rate from the Idaho Fish Accord Water Transactions Fund and held in the Water Transaction Subaccount of the Board's Revolving Development Account for annual payment to the water right owner through the Water Supply Bank.

Dear Colonel Henderson,

As Governor, it has been one of my highest priorities to assist the Mountain Home Air Force Base (Base) with developing a sustainable water supply. The solution is to build a water pipeline from the nearby Snake River to the Base, so the Base is no longer dependent on the declining Mountain Home Aquifer. The State of Idaho has been diligently working towards this goal for several years. So far, we have obtained senior-priority water rights from the Snake River, undertaken water testing so a treatment plant can be designed, completed geotechnical testing along the pipeline route, and most recently, secured right-of-way from the Bureau of Land Management through the Morley Nelson Snake River Birds of Prey National Conservation Area. However, there has been an issue in building and payment obligations for the final implementation of the project between USAF and the state of Idaho.

On September 24, a meeting was held with several members of the Idaho Water Resource Board and Wing Commander Col. Joseph Kunkel of the Mountain Home Air Force Base. There was discussion about pathways to accomplish this critical project. The idea of splitting the project to have the State of Idaho build the pump station and pipeline while the Air Force builds the water treatment plant was viewed as having the highest likelihood of success.

It is my intention that, subject to the Legislature's appropriation process and a commitment from the Base to provide a water treatment plant, the State of Idaho would build, own, and operate the pump station and pipeline. A commitment from the Base will reassure us that this goal can be met on this critical project. I look forward to your response regarding the Base's commitment.

**REQUIRED ACTION:** Staff is seeking authorization from the Board to have a Professional Engineer, with

experience in construction, to prepare and Opinion of Probable Cost ("OPC") for the pump

station and pipeline in order to assist with future financial planning for the Project.

#### **Project Concept**

The Mountain Home Air Force Base (Base) currently relies on groundwater for its water supply, but diverts its water from a critical declining aquifer. In 2014, with support from the Governor and Idaho State Legislature, the Board purchased senior Snake River water rights from the Simplot Corporation to provide a water supply to the Base. The surface water will be diverted out of the C.J. Strike Reservoir through a pump station and pipeline and delivered to a treatment plant for municipal use at the Base. The Board is expected to retain the senior water rights and enter into a contract with the Base for the delivery of water.

#### **Project Update**

<u>Procurement Cancellation & Termination of Owner's Advisor Contract</u> – On September 27, 2018 the Board passed a resolution to cancel its procurement for Design-Build-Operate Services to develop the entire Project, and to terminate its contract with Brown and Caldwell (the Board's "Owner's Advisor"). Since that time, the Owner's Advisor contract has been terminated and Staff has been closing out the Project and finalizing deliverables from the Owner's Advisor. The Board will receive the final Owner's Advisor deliverables by November 27, 2018.

Owner's Advisor Deliverables – The Owner's Advisor began a second phase of pilot testing in June of 2018 and conducted the test into September of 2018 (approximately 2.5 months). The purpose of the study was to determine which treatment processes could be necessary to treat the algae that is present in the C.J. Strike Reservoir. The Board will receive an approval of from IDEQ on phase II of the pilot study testing by the end of November which will complete the Owner's Advisor's services.

- Raw Water Characterization for the C.J. Strike Reservoir
- IDEQ Approved Facility Plan Addendum
- IDEQ Approved Technical, Financial, and Managerial Report
- Phase I & II Pilot Testing

- Topographic Survey (Aerial Imagery, Topo, and Property Ownership)
- Utility Identification and Coordination
- Wetland Delineation

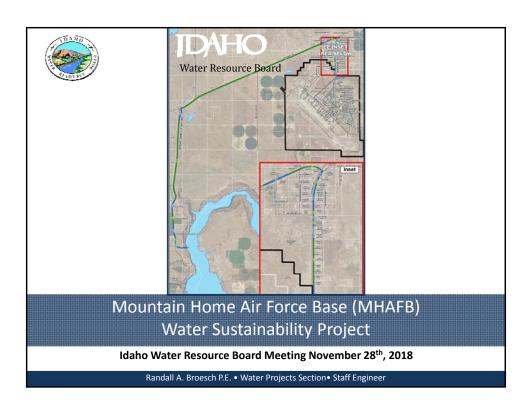

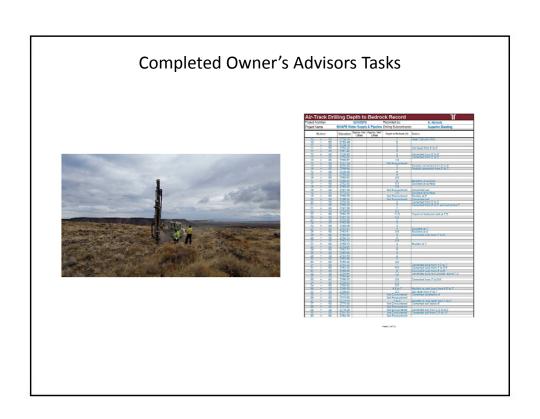
Revised Project Concept and Future Actions – In November, the Office of the Governor sent a letter to the MHAFB offering its continued support for developing a sustainable water supply (letter included with Board materials). The Governor also endorsed the concept of splitting the project components such that the Board would be responsible for Project construction and operation of the pump station and pipeline while the MHAFB would develop and operate the water treatment plant. The revised project concept would be subject to the legislative appropriation process and a commitment by the MHAFB to development and operate the water treatment plant. Staff and the MHAFB continue to coordinate on the revised concept in an effort to determine the process and timeline ahead leading to the delivery of the entire Project.

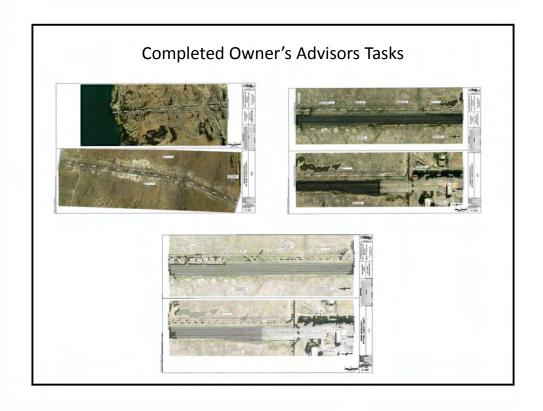

WHEREAS, the Idaho Water Resource Board ("Board") is a constitutional agency of the State of Idaho and empowered by Idaho Code §42-1734 to acquire, purchase, lease or exchange land, rights, water rights, easements, franchises and other property deemed necessary or proper for construction, operation and maintenance of water projects; and

WHEREAS, the Mountain Home Air Force Base ("Base"), as well as surrounding agricultural wells and municipal wells, draw their supply from the Mountain Home Aquifer; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Department of Water Resources ("IDWR") estimates that the rate of withdrawal from the Mountain Home Aquifer exceeds the rate of natural recharge to the aquifer and due to declining ground water levels, IDWR established the Cinder Cone Butte Critical Ground Water Area in 1981 and the Mountain Home Ground Water Management Area in 1982; and

WHEREAS, the State of Idaho recognizes the economic value of the Base to the local and state economy and supports the United States military in achieving its national security functions; and

WHEREAS, the Board purchased senior Snake River water rights and is coordinating with the Base to develop a pipeline and water treatment plant to deliver treated Snake River water to the Base as a long-term sustainable water supply to support the Base and its mission (Project); and

WHEREAS, the Board terminated the procurement for design-build-operate services to develop the full Project and Owner's Advisor services on September 28, 2018; and

WHEREAS, Board and Base representatives met to develop a revised concept which would split responsibility for development of Project components such that the Base would construct and operate the water treatment plant and the Board would construct and operate the pump station and pipeline; and

WHEREAS, both parties concluded splitting responsibility for Project components is the most likely scenario to ensure successful completion of the water delivery Project; and

WHEREAS, the Office of the Governor issued a letter on November 6, 2018 supporting the revised Project concept, and subject to the Legislature's appropriation process and a commitment from the Base, the State of Idaho will construct and operate the pump station and pipeline; and

Re: Status Update on Flood Management Grants

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#### **No Action Required**

House Bill 712 passed and approved by the 2018 Legislature included a FY 2018 transfer of \$1,000,000 from the General Fund to the Water Management Fund in the Department of Water Resources budget. This funding was intended for a grant program administered by the Idaho Water Resource Board to provide competitive grants for flood-damaged stream channel repair, stream channel improvement, flood risk reduction, or flood prevention projects.

Staff received a total of eighteen (18) applications during the two rounds of funding. The applications and sponsor's grant documents were evaluated, scored, and ranked according to criteria adopted by Board. The Board authorized funding for fourteen (14) projects throughout Idaho for a total of \$1,000,000.

Lewiston Regional Deep Aquifer Investigation

No action required at this time.

#### Background

- Problems of ground-water level decline in shallow basalt aquifers in the areas south and east of Lewiston have been known since the 1990's. The Idaho Department of Water Resources (IDWR) designated the Lindsay Creek Ground Water Management Area (GWMA) in 1992. A larger area of water-level decline in wells completed in shallow basalt aquifers was identified in more recent years by the IDWR. The Lindsay Creek GWMA order was rescinded and the much larger Lewiston Plateau GWMA was designated on May 20, 2013. After considerable public input, a ground water management plan for the Lewiston Plateau GWMA was adopted by IDWR on March 25, 2015. The listed goals of the management plan for the Lewiston Plateau GWMA are as follows: 1) protect existing shallow aquifers from further decline, 2) protect existing and future ground water rights and ground water quality, 3) improve the understanding about the existence and location of the regional and shallow aquifers, 4) encourage education and outreach efforts that promote conservation of the ground water resources and 5) provide reasonable growth opportunities from available water supplies.
- On March 19th 2016, the IWRB adopted a resolution approving the expenditure of \$90,000 from the IWRB's Secondary Fund for the analysis of the eastern and southern portions of the Lewiston Ground Water Management Area targeted at improving the understanding, the location, and the yield of the regional deep aquifer (phase one).
- The phase one analysis of the eastern and southern portions of the Lewiston Plateau Ground Water Management Area was completed in April 2017 and it produced important initial data regarding the recharge mechanisms for the Grande Ronde aquifers. However, the analysis identified additional work needed to address questions regarding the sustainability of the Grande Ronde aquifers.
- On May 18, 2017 the IWRB adopted a resolution approving the expenditure of up to additional \$110,000 from the IWRB's Secondary Fund to collect more hydrologic and geologic data to better address questions regarding the sustainability of regional deep aquifer (phase two).
- Dr. Dale Ralston from Ralston Hydrologic Services completed both phases of work and is here today to discuss the results and address any questions.

# IN THE MATTER OF BEAR LAKE WATER STORAGE

#### **RESOLUTION TO AUTHORIZE FUNDS**

WHEREAS, the Bear River flows through the States of Idaho, Wyoming, and Utah. It begins in the Uinta Mountains of Utah, meanders back and forth between Utah and Wyoming before entering Idaho near Montpelier and flowing through Idaho to Utah before discharging to the Great Salt Lake; and WHEREAS, the entire flow of the Bear River is diverted in Idaho at Stewart Dam into Mud Lake and Bear Lake. The water is subsequently returned to the Bear River's natural channel; and WHEREAS, the Bear River is subject to an interstate compact dated February 8, 1980 and codified by Idaho Code 42-3402 ("Bear River Compact"); and WHEREAS, the Bear River Compact sets forth, among other things, allocation in the Lower Division as between Idaho and Utah for future water development, including ground water; and WHEREAS, under the Bear River Compact Idaho has the first right to the remaining water in the Lower Division resulting in an annual depletion of not more than 125,000 acre-feet, and Utah has the second right to the remaining water in the Lower Division resulting in an annual depletion of not more than 225,000 acre-feet; and WHEREAS, pursuant to the designation of the Bear River Ground Water Management Area, the Bear River Ground Water Management Plan was prepared by a committee of local stakeholders and adopted by the Idaho Department of Water Resources (IDWR) in 2003. Among other recommendations, the Bear River Ground Water Management Plan states: "The advisory committee recommended preparation of a comprehensive state water plan for the Bear River Basin in Idaho. A water plan could recommend feasibility studies for new storage facilities and other water supply enhancements. Additional storage could facility development of the first 125,000 acre-feet of depletion allowed to Idaho in the Bear River Compact. New storage could be in surface reservoirs or underground as managed aquifer recharge;" and
